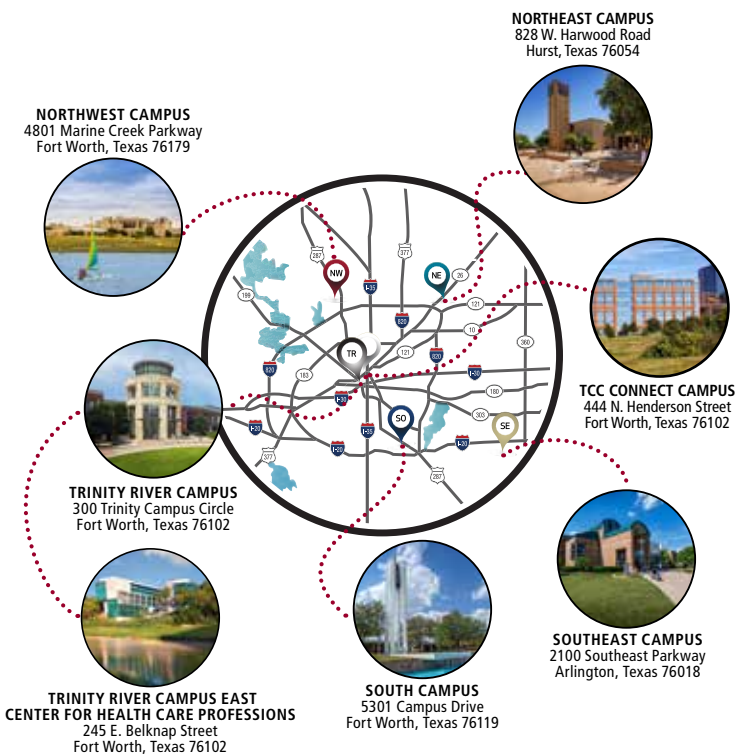

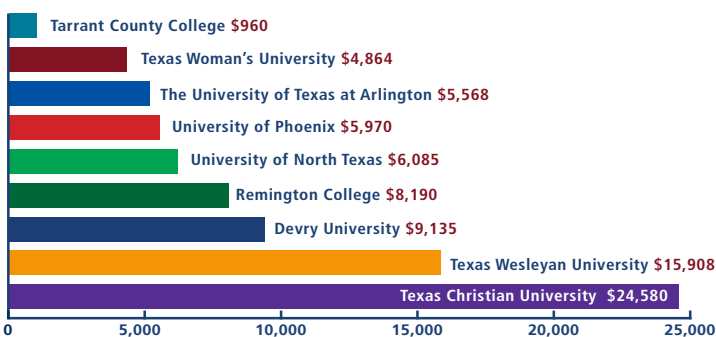

TCC also offers different occupational/technical programs: 68 Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degrees, 132 Certificates of Completion and 18 Occupational Skills Awards. Additionally, specializations and fields of study are also offered within degree plans for the AA and AS.

Class is always in session at TCC with e-Learning courses available through TCC Connect. The College's sixth campus provides quality distance education, spanning 350 credit courses. It also offers Weekend College that uses technology to merge face-to-face, hybrid and fully online courses.
